OUR MISSION

Save lives by improving pre-hospital emergency care.

The Medic One Foundation is a community-based nonprofit organization dedicated to saving lives by improving pre-hospital emergency care. The Foundation supports critical programs and initiatives that have a significant impact on the number of lives saved through fundraising, advocacy, and collaboration.

When faced with a life-threatening medical emergency, you probably never think about the quality of training paramedics receive or how to improve your chances of survival before you even reach the hospital.

But the Medic One Foundation does—every day. Thanks to you and your support of the Medic One Foundation, we are saving more lives.



In 2019, contributions to the Medic One Foundation made it possible to:

- Train and certify 22 new paramedics who are now in the field saving lives in Bellevue, Bainbridge Island, Everett, Lake Stevens, Marysville, Redmond, San Juan Islands, Seattle, South King County, and South Snohomish County.
- Purchase three training manikins for the Paramedic Training Program to be used during hands-on drills, where paramedic students test their skills on very vulnerable “patients.”
- Fund 30 hours of continuing medical education for more than 280 paramedics in the Puget Sound area, as well as first responders throughout Washington, Alaska, Montana and Idaho via live video feed of continuing education classes.
- Fund the development of a high-fidelity, simulation-based training curriculum for airway management with the goal of improving skill performance in the field by paramedics.
- Train over 800 citizen responders through our expanded CPR/AED and First Aid training program for businesses, civic and neighborhood groups, and community residents.
- Award much-needed emergency equipment, including patient monitors, rescue equipment, and training manikins, to fire departments serving Arlington, Bainbridge Island, Bellevue, Bremerton, Darrington, East Jefferson, Enumclaw, Lopez Island, Marysville, Oso, Poulsbo, Ravensdale, San Juan Island, Seattle and Tulalip.

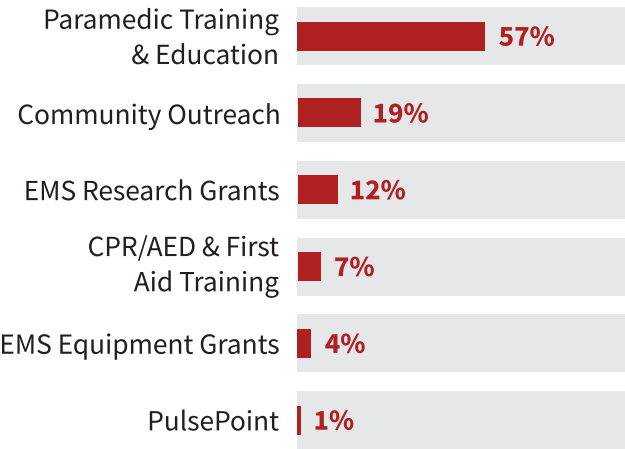

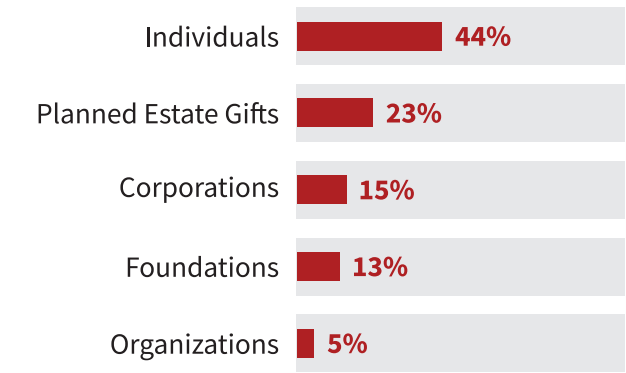
