Our deepest thanks to all who supported Medic One Foundation and our mission of saving lives. Below are some of the ways that your support directly impacted the quality of our region's extraordinary Medic One system. Your gift to Medic One Foundation last year made it possible to:

- Train and certify twenty-three new paramedics who are now in the field saving lives in Bellevue, East Jefferson County, Everett, Port Ludlow, Redmond, Seattle, Shoreline, South King County, South Snohomish County, and Tulalip.
- Provide continuing medical education for more than 270 working paramedics in the Puget Sound region.
- Purchase three training manikins for the Medic One Paramedic Training and Continuing Education Program to be used by active paramedics and paramedic students during hands-on training drills.
- Launch the Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Scholarship Program to help remove financial barriers for individuals interested in pursuing a career in emergency medicine.
- Fully adapt our CPR/AED and First Aid training programs into virtual formats and partner with local community groups to expand our target audience, educating over 1,000 adults and children in CPR/AED and First Aid.
- Award much-needed emergency equipment to thirteen fire and EMS providers serving King, Kittitas, San Juan, and Snohomish County.
- Install PulsePoint—a mobile app that alerts users to cardiac arrests nearby so that they can begin CPR before first responders arrive—for King and Snohomish County.

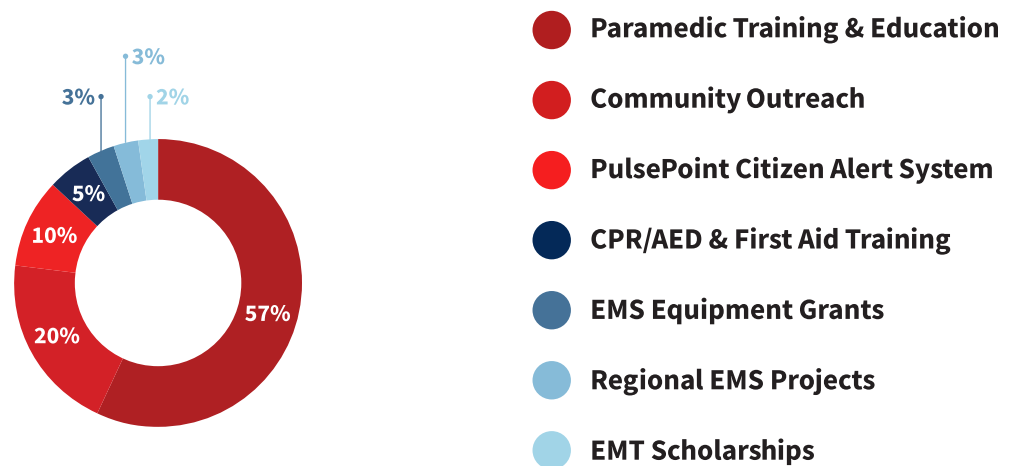

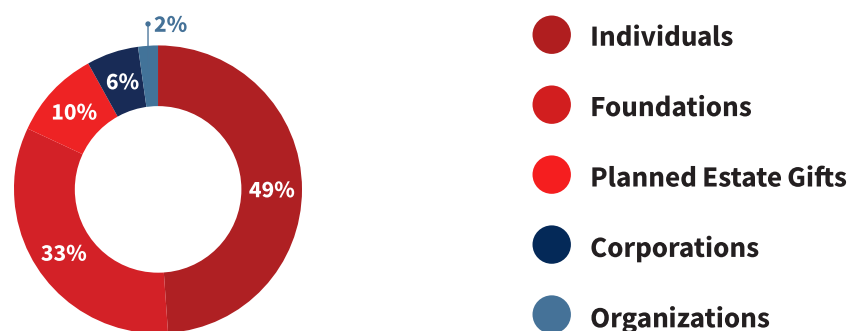
Impact of Your Generosity
