

# 50 YEARS OF LIFESAVING IMPACT

Since 1974, the Medic One Foundation has been at the forefront of funding programs that ensure the highest standards in pre-hospital emergency care. What began as a bold idea—training paramedics to deliver advanced care in the field—has grown into a nationally recognized model that has saved countless lives and inspired communities around the world.

## **OUR IMPACT, BY THE NUMBERS**

- \$17 million invested in advanced paramedic training for over 700 paramedics
- \$6 million directed toward improving emergency response protocols and outcomes
- \$3 million dedicated to research that advances the field of pre-hospital care
- \$1.5 million invested in emergency medical equipment for 50+ fire and EMS providers
- \$7.5 million+ committed to special projects like CPR/AED training, EMT scholarships, Medic II, mental health resilience, and the Resuscitation Academy

Thanks to donor support, the Foundation has championed some of the most influential FMS initiatives in the world:


- Dispatch Telephone CPR that guides bystanders through lifesaving interventions

# 2024 IMPACT AT A GLANCE

Thanks to your generosity, 2024 was a year of real results. Together, we expanded access to critical training, introduced new tools to save lives, and invested in innovations that strengthen emergency care across our region.

### STRENGTHENING PARAMEDIC EXCELLENCE

- Trained 27 new Medic One paramedics, now serving seven departments in the greater Puget Sound region
- Welcomed 30 new students into our intensive
   10-month Paramedic Training Program
- Funded research to revitalize airway
  management curriculum—modernizing
  paramedic education, advancing national best
  practices, and developing the next generation
  of educator-leaders

#### **BUILDING A MORE INCLUSIVE EMS WORKFORCE**

 Awarded 18 EMT scholarships to expand diversity and opportunity in emergency care



### **EXPANDING LIFESAVING ACCESS**

- Donated 19 AEDs to nonprofit organizations through our new Community AED Program
- Equipped 9 fire and EMS agencies with critical emergency care and training equipment

## EMPOWERING EVERYDAY RESPONDERS

- Trained over 3,000 individuals through 200+ CPR/AED & First Aid classes
- Expanded our Youth CPR/First Aid program
- Sponsored the PulsePoint responder app to activate citizen responders during cardiac arrests

## INVESTING IN INNOVATION AND FIRST RESPONDER WELLNESS

- Funded a new mental wellness platform designed specifically to support the unique needs of first responders
- Supported the UWEMS student-led EMS outreach and training initiative
- Funded innovative research to equip paramedics with portable ultrasound technology-helping improve diagnostic accuracy and resuscitation outcomes

## PARAMEDIC TRAINING

## **BUILDING LIFESAVERS FOR OUR REGION**



#### PATIENT CONTACTS

Students average 600 patient contacts, which is more than 3x the national average.



#### **MEDICAL SKILLS**

Class performs, on average, over 4,000 IVs and 1,000 intubations, two of the most difficult skills to master.



## **TREATMENT**

Students participate in the treatments of over 250 sudden cardiac arrest victims combined.



#### **HOURS OF INSTRUCTION**

Students receive 2,100 hours of instruction, which is nearly double the national recommendation.

For more than 50 years, charitable contributions have made it possible for the Medic One Foundation to deliver one of the most rigorous and respected paramedic training programs in the nation. Thanks to community support, our region's paramedics receive advanced, hands-on education that goes far beyond national standards—preparing them to respond with skill, precision, and confidence when every second counts.

To date, donor generosity has helped train over **700 paramedics** serving **20 fire and EMS agencies** and protecting more than **2.5 million people** across the region.

In 2024, we took bold steps to strengthen the program's future—funding research to modernize airway management education, investing in cutting-edge simulation tools, and launching a new strategic plan to expand impact and meet growing demand for highly trained paramedics.

## **EMT SCHOLARSHIPS**

## **OPENING DOORS TO THE FUTURE OF EMS**

The Medic One Foundation's EMT Scholarship Program, created in partnership with North Seattle College, is helping to build a more inclusive and accessible pathway into emergency medicine. By removing financial barriers and expanding opportunity for underrepresented individuals, this program is developing the next generation of EMTs who will go on to serve communities across Washington state.

Since its launch, the program has awarded 60 scholarships, helping students begin meaningful careers in lifesaving care.

In 2024, generous support from PNC Bank enabled us to award 18 new scholarships empowering more aspiring EMTs to take the first step into the field and contribute to the strength and diversity of our region's EMS system.

## **COMMUNITY AED GRANTS:**

## LIFESAVING ACCESS WHERE IT'S NEEDED MOST

For over 25 years, the Medic One Foundation has partnered with fire departments, EMS agencies, and healthcare organizations to fund essential equipment that improves emergency care—awarding more than \$1.5 million to date, including \$50,000 in 2024 for high-impact tools like trauma kits and advanced simulation devices.

Priority was given to underserved areas where quick access to an AED can mean the difference between life and death.

With donor support, we awarded 19 AEDs to local organizations, empowering more communities to save lives before help arrives.

# **EMS EQUIPMENT GRANTS:**

## **ADVANCING CARE ACROSS OUR REGION**

In 2024, we awarded \$50,000 in grants for high-impact tools—from trauma kits to advanced simulation devices—bringing our total to more than \$1.5 million in equipment funding to date.

## **SPECIAL PROJECTS**

## **ADVANCING INNOVATION IN EMS**

In 2024, the Medic One Foundation supported several targeted initiatives to strengthen the future of emergency care:

## FIRST RESPONDER MENTAL WELLNESS

Invested in mental health and resilience resources for EMS professionals, including funding for a licensed mental health counselor to support paramedic students. We also provided grant funding to explore new peer support technologies designed to reduce burnout and promote long-term wellness among first responders.

### **UWEMS PILOT PROGRAM**

Partnered with UWEMS, Washington's first collegiate-based EMS agency, to support student EMTs providing basic life support on campus—assisting Seattle Fire and enhancing safety across the UW community.

## **ULTRASOUND PILOT RESEARCH**

Supported a field study on paramedic-performed ultrasound to improve early diagnosis of respiratory distress in the field—an innovation with the potential to transform pre-hospital care.

### **EXPANDING ACCESS TO LIFESAVING CPR**

In 2024, Medic One Foundation trained over 3,000 adults and 800 youth in CPR, AED use, and First Aid through 200+ community and workplace classes. From students to professionals, our hands-on training helped people act quickly and confidently when every second counts.

Through our Youth Outreach Program, we partnered with groups like ScoutReach and Nick of Time to bring lifesaving education to schools, camps, and events—empowering kids as young as kindergarten to learn CPR and understand how EMS works in their community.

We also continued funding PulsePoint in King County—a free mobile app that alerts nearby trained users to cardiac arrests, locates AEDs, and shares real-time emergency updates. With more than 20,000 local responders, PulsePoint is turning bystanders into lifesavers.

Because saving lives doesn't start in the back of an ambulance—it starts with all of us.

## **CELEBRATING GENEROSITY**

## LIFESAVERS GALA: A NIGHT TO REMEMBER

In celebration of our 50th anniversary, the 2024 Lifesavers Gala was our most successful to date—raising over \$1.2 million to support Paramedic Training Class #50.

Held on October 26, the Gala welcomed almost 500 quests, including first responders, medical professionals, and community supporters, to honor the brave firefighters and paramedics who respond every day to life-threatening emergencies across our region.

Keynote speaker Brent Beardall shared his powerful survival story following a near-fatal plane crash, reminding us just how critical high-quality emergency care can be. The mission video featured two 19-year-olds whose lives were saved thanks to the fast, expert care of Medic One-trained responders. Funds raised provided world-class training, high-fidelity equipment, and essential educational tools for the next generation of lifesavers. It was an unforgettable night of impact, inspiration, and community.






